



February, **order seeds** for spring and summer vegetables and herbs such as pepper, pumpkin, tomato, corn, zucchini, basil. Johnny Seeds, San Diego Seed Co., Baker Creek Heirloom Seed Co., Seeds & Such, Renee's Seeds. Flower seeds from Botanical Interests

Plant seeds of beets, carrots, collards, fava beans, kale, leeks, lettuce, parsley, rutabaga, spinach, turnip.

Berries are now available to plant.



Blueberries, varieties recommended: Sunshine Blue, Bountiful Blue, Emerald, Biloxi, Jubilee, O'Neal, Misty. For the biggest production and healthiest plants, grow them in a container filled with acidic potting mix. Fertilize regularly, water deeply, and place them in half to full day sun.

Grass: Cut back ornamental grasses before new growth starts. Gather the blades by looping twine around the clump, about 12 inches above ground. Pull the twine tight around the blades, and then cut the grass about 4 to 6 inches above ground. Compost the clippings.


Method to check water level underground: To see if a planting bed needs water, dig a hole 4 to 6 inches deep. If the soil at the bottom is damp, don't water. If it is dry, water deeply, then wait for the soil to dry out before watering again.

Feb: **Fertilize citrus and avocado along the coast**. Use a granular organic fertilizer and follow label directions. Brand Grow Power for citrus and Avocado recommended.

Mosquitoes breed in anything that holds standing water: pots, buckets, birdbaths, etc. Hose out birdbaths regularly and empty vessels filled with dirty water.

Bug of the Month: Thysanoptera: Thrips





Natural enemies of thrips



Minute pirate bug



Banded thrips



lacewings

Control dust and avoid broad-

spectrum insecticides to encourage natural enemies.





Management

- Prune out some species
- Excessive nitrogen may increase some species
- For most plants, insecticides not necessary or use soaps or oils.
- Spinosad can be effective
- Pyrethin + PBO for greenhouse thrips

Myoporum thrips

- · Almost impossible to manage without regular insecticide treatments
- · Replant with more pest resistant species
